DIRECT EXAMINATION

<u>BY MR. BRIGHT</u>:

- Q. Mr. Aznaran, would you state your name for the record and spell your last name.
 - A. Richard Aznaran, A-z-n-a-r-a-n.
- Q. Mr. Aznaran, I take it you know most of the people in the room. Let me start just to make sure you're aware of who everybody is and who they represent. The court reporter, named Lori, is taking down everything that's being said in the room, both my questions to you and your answers back.

Mr. Fagelbaum who represents the

Defendants David Mayo and Church of the New

Civilization is seated immediately to my right.

My name is Gary Bright. I also represent David

Q. And would you please describe your duties as personal public relations officer at

Flag Land Base?

A. At the Flag Land Base initially at that time L. Ron Hubbard was very upset with the amount of money being made by the Flag service org and not being able to get, I guess, what he felt were proper responses to his orders to the Flag Land Base.

Mr. Hubbard sent me -- I was basically operating off of his personal orders and directives initially. In other words, he wrote to me and told me that he was very upset with the other people at Flag, and that he wanted me to be his personal eyes and ears and mouth, and to act on his behalf at the base.

He would give me instructions. The idea being to bring about an environment where L. Ron Hubbard would get what he considered proper compliance to his orders and directives into the base.

Q. Where was Mr. Hubbard located at the time you were stationed at the Flag Land Base in Clearwater, Florida, to your knowledge?

A. At that time I had no personal knowledge of where he might be. I later came to find out that he was in Southern California.

1 Q.Did you ever meet him personally aZ That! 2 period of time? 3 A. Face-to-face, no. How did you know these were Hubbard's 4 orders that you were carrying out? 5 A. Well, there's several ways. They were 6 7 identified as such, number one. They were signed 8 by him, number two. And, number three, after you've been around awhile, you learn to recognize 9 a certain flavor or -- I don't know -- I quess the 10 nature of his communications were beyond what 11 12 anybody else would have had the audacity to communicate in writing. 13 O. You earlier described that Hubbard was 14 upset with the performance of the Flag service 15 org. What was the function of that organization 16 to your understanding? 17 Well, I guess the formal function as 18 presented to public scientologists is that the 19 Flag service org was the mecca, that's their term, 20 of standard tech, meaning that if you were to get 21 auditing and other lower organizations and you 22 weren't happy or felt you wasn't totally as 23 groovie as it should be, that you should come to 24 Flag and they would fix you right up. 25

There was also levels 6f auditing 1 counseling that were only available at Flag at 2 3 unbelievable prices. And there was also Flag at that time -- the Flag service org at that time was 5 also the place where staff for missions and organizations came to train, and -- well, public 6 7 as well actually. 8 Did you have any functions with the 9 Scientology Technology or materials as of your 10 assignment in 1979 at Flag? 11 I don't understand the question. 12 Well, Scientology is a religious 0. 13 organization, correct? 14 Well, I don't agree with that, but 15 that's what they say, yeah. 16 That was your understanding in 1979, Ο. 17 correct? 18 Α. Yeah. And as part of the dissemination of Q. 19 their religion, they have various bulletins or 20 issues in which the ideas and philosophies of the 21 religion are expressed? 22 Α. Well, they have -- I assume you're 23 talking about red on white H -- Hubbard 24 communications office bulletins as opposed to 25

- policy letters. There's also tape-recoraea
- 2 | lectures from Hubbard, books, all that.
- Q. Did you have any duties in respect to the red on white Hubbard's communication office bulletins?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. What was the nature of your duties?
- A. Well, I guess initially was when I was in the public relations office Hubbard would write to me and tell me he was coming out with some such and such bulletin, and that I was to do a PR campaign to make sure it was well received by staff. I don't know if that really is what you're

talking about. But, anyway, I did that at first.

A little later on he had what was called a TR's mission at Flag, or TR stands for training routines, where some of his messengers from Southern California were there acting on his behalf operating a pilot program on outer org staff members. Outer org meaning people from the lower level organizations. That mission became bugged, and I was asked to do an investigation as to why it was bugged, which I did, and reported directly to Hubbard on it.

There were also times when I was asked

- 1 as public relations officer to act as 2 intermediary with David Mayo and then senior cramming officer, Dennis Earlich. So as far as 3 4 having something to do with the technology, those 5 are the initial things at Flag. 6 Later after, I quess, approximately 7 1980, mid, early, mid '80 I became a case 8 supervisor at Flag where I personally trained under Ray Mithoff, who at that time was the senior 9 case supervisor of the Flag Land Base. I was 10 later promoted to the position of senior case 11 supervisor for all Flag staff, again personally 12 trained by Mithoff. 13 At that time my training advanced to the 14
 - level of solo co-supervisor NED for OT'S. NED standing for New Era Dianetics for OT•s, case

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Q. When did you act as an intermediary for David Mayo?

supervisor and a sundry other courses in there.

A. In -- I'm sorry. That isn't actually worded correctly. At the time I'm thinking of Mayo was actually at the same location as Hubbard. Jeff Walker was the senior CS for the Flag service org. Jeff Walker was involved in extracurricular sexual activities for which he was

1 Α. Yes. 2. Pursuant to that, were you ever audited 0. 3 or received counseling on what is known as NOTs or NED for OT's? 4 Yes, I did. Α. 5 6 Ο. When did you receive that auditing? 7 From -- let's see. NOTs, I believe, was Α. released -- when the hell was it released? 8 December of '78. And I think I received some NOTs 9 auditing in '79, and I received NOTs auditing in 10 some form or fashion up until the point where I 11 left the church, which was April of whatever year 12 it was, '87. '87. Are you paying attention? 13 14 MS. McRAE: Uh-huh. MR. BRIGHT: As much as ever. 15 16 Q. Do you have any information concerning 17 the authorship of NOTs materials? 18 iTi Yori How did you acquire this information? 19 Ο. 20 Α. From the different positions I held during my tenure within the sea organization. 21 Q. And specifically what are those 22 23 positions? 24 Well, okay. As a NOTs case supervisor, 25 as a senior auditor at Gilman Hot Springs in 1981

- and '82, later through ethics handlings that were 1 taken on Mr. Mayo, and through seeing 2 3 communication both from Hubbard -- well, from 4 Hubbard, as well as other senior Scientology executives as well as personal communication with 5 these individuals. 6 7 Q. Do you have any information where the 8 original NOTs bulletins were authored? 9 A. Yes. They were authored -- I'm trying 10 to think of the name. I don't remember the actual 11 building, but they were authored there at Gilman 12 Hot Springs. 13 Q. And do you know the approximate date 14 they were authored? 15 A. Well, they originally issued in late, 16 very late '78, and then there were revisions which 17 occurred after that. So I mean I don't know how 18 to answer that, I guess. 19 O. Do you have any information as to how 20 the original bulletins were created? 21 Oh, sure. Α. What information is that? 22 Q.
 - A. Well, Hubbard had done some tapes, and from those tapes, David Mayo put together the NED for OT's bulletins. In fact, even when I was back

- at the Flag Land Base as a NED for OT's auditor 1 2 and case supervisor, this was common knowledge because the original bulletins that Mayo put out 3 4 were signed by L. Ron Hubbard with a colon and David Mayo's initials after that. And the ones 5 6 there were a few that were actually written by 7 Hubbard which did not have David Mayo's initials 8 on them.
- 9 Q. How many original NOTs bulletins were there to your recollection?
- A. God, I don't remember. There was a bunch.
- Q. Do you have an estimate?
 - A. Original ones?
 - Q. Yes.

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- A. I mean like original meaning like the actual first time NED for OT*s hit the streets?
 - Q. Yes.
- A. Twenty. I'm kind of guessing, but I couldn't be off by more than ten or so.

The purpose of the mission was to stalk and conduct a surveillance on Mr. Nelson while he was in the Far East and document his activities, hopefully finding him making some kind of drug connections or drug buys and so forth.
- Q. Did you have any other job duties in respect to Mr. Nelson?
- A. Well, just the ways that we would do that.

QT What ways were those?

MR. HELLER: I'm going to move to strike as nonresponsive. I object to the answer.

THE WITNESS: Okay. Well, the idea was that hopefully he would go over there and, like I say, make drug buys and be involved in some kind of criminal activity, to document and find that out, to bug his rooms, and, like I say, surveilling, and just see who -- we used local investigators in the area and so forth. If we didn't catch him doing anything such as that, there the idea was to possibly set him up to get caught for doing something like that.

- Q. And who told you that if you could not find him engaging in illegal or criminal activities you were attempt to set him up in illegal or criminal activities?
- A. That conversation took place just prior to my departure from Los Angeles, and Marty Rathbun, Warren McShane, and Greg Rierson were present.
 - Q. Where was the conversation held?
- A. The conversation was held in the legal offices of RTC, what they called their legal offices, not where attorneys were.

- 1 Were any attorneys present? Q. 2 Α. No. 3 Did any attorneys communicate with the Ο. meeting by phone or by writing or by telex or 4 5 anything of that nature? 6 Not to my knowledge. - Q. Do you recall any of the specific language that was used by anybody else at the meeting which conveyed that impression to you?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. What language was that?
- A. It was basically -- I was being told to follow them and try to catch him doing something,

andthento get the local police involved. And this was communicated as this would be like a very serious thing because some of the countries we were going to, for example, Singapore has very serious laws against drug smuggling and so forth, and that there would be different ways to do that.

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We could use local operatives, investigators, and so forth to assist us. We should check -- you know, find out who the -- try to do it from both angles. In other words, try to find who the bad guys were so that we could watch -- we would be alerted to -- we could communicate with them to hopefully get it in with them so that we would know if Nelson approached them, if that makes sense. I don't know if I said that right.

- Q. How was it communicated to you that if you were unsuccessful in your surveillance in discovering criminal activity you were to create criminal activity?
 - A. Make it up.

MR. HELLER: This has been asked and answered now this is probably the third or fourth time.

- Q. At some point did you come to the conclusion that Mr. Nelson was not going to engage in criminal activity on his own volition?

That was later in the mission. Yes. 1 How long did it take you to come to that 2 Ο. conclusion? 3 The best way for me to place that in 4 time is to give you just a short chronology. 5 Okay. that he could not be involved in such activity?

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A. He went bozo. He just passed his bar and I guess he wasn't putting any of that on the line.

Q. What specifically did you suggest to Mr. Wagner that you were willing to undertake on behalf of the Church of Scientology that Mr. Wagner vetoed?

MR. HELLER: Objection. Assumes facts not in evidence. It's also leading.

THE WITNESS: We were in Hong Kong. We had a local guy working for us. We were, the three of us, were briefing, debriefing, one of our meetings, whatever. The local contact indicated that he had a personal association with a local triad leader. This was in response to a guestion of mine.

I had told him to find out if it would be possible to set up a meeting between myself and this person. Rory asked me why I wanted to meet with this guy, and I said, well, if we get this guy on our side, we can arrange it so that he'll tell us if Nelson approaches him or any of his representatives on anything concerning drugs, and that, you know, if not, maybe we could set

 - A. I don't know, five, ten miles.
- Q. Is the area in between the Gilman Hot Springs location and Himmet sparsely populated?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Would you describe for me the area at Gilman Hot Springs, the physical attributes of the area?
- A. All right. It's located on Highway 79. It's what used to be an old -- what used to be a golf course. The total property, as I recall, at that location was five hundred or five hundred and fifty acres. Probably a couple hundred of those acres were within chain link fence and surrounded by high technology security equipment to prevent -- to alert security personnel if anybody should try to come or go. It's divided in two by Highway 79.

- Q~. Fs this a facility maintained by some or any of the organizations encompassed by the Church of Scientology?
 - A. Several, yes.

Q. Which organizations have an interest in Gilman Hot Springs as of 1982, early 1983?

MR. HELLER: Objection as to relevance and also it's ambiguous, and lack of foundation as to the witness is able to answer the question as interpreted.

- O. Go ahead.
- A. What was the question? Organizations, okay. Let's see. RTC was located there, its headquarters. Commodore's messengers organization international was headquartered there. Golden Era Studios later known as Golden Era Productions was located there. L. Ron Hubbard's residence and personal staff were located there. Commodore's messenger organization for S was located there. I should define that S. That S was an early term used for Gilman within the organization and stood for summer headquarters.
- Q. The various organizations you just described they actually had physical offices at the Gilman Hot Springs location, correct?

Ā~i ¯ Absolutely, sure. 1 Q. And inside buildings at the location? 2 Yeah. 3 Α. Was there one specific compound at the 4 Q. location wherein all these offices and buildings 5 6 were housed? There's several buildings there. Α. No. 7 Q. Are those buildings adjacent to each 8 9 other --Oh, sure. Yeah. 10 Α. --or are they spread over the whole 0. 11 12 five hundred acres? 13 No. They're within the two hundred 14 acres I described as being within the fenced 15 perimeter. The office buildings were on the, I 16 believe, east side, the side toward the mountains 17 in any case, and that's where all the office 18 buildings were. 19 Is that also the area that's contained 0. 20 by a chain link fence? 21 Α. Yes. Is that area guarded by guards? Q. 22 Α. Yes. 23 Q. Who employed the guards? 24 MR. HELLER: I object to --25

1 THE WITNESS: Meaning who gave them 2 their money? 3 MR. BRIGHT: Strike the question. 4 Do you know who employed the guards at Ο. 5 Gilman Hot Springs? 6 Α. Sure. 7 Q. Who? 8 MR. HELLER: I'm going to object really to the whole line of questioning on the basis of 9 10 relevance to the issues in this lawsuit. 11 THE WITNESS: When you say employed, 1' ask that you be a little more specific because 12 they were paid by one group and run by another 13 14 group. 15 Who paid the guards at Gilman? Q. 16 Α. They received their pay from Golden Era 17 Studios. 18 Q. And who ran the guards at Gilman? I did. - Q. And who within Scientology paid you for your activities as a safety officer at Gilman?
- A. Okay. Initially -- initially, I don't know where the money came from, just prior to RTC being formally established. Then it was by RTC.

 Later it was OSA International, CMO International, CMO Gold.
- Q. What determined which organization would actually pay your salary, if you know?
- A. Well, I know, but I don't know if I can -- I mean it's not a facetious answer. The honest to God truth would be depending on how pissed off DM was at me at any particular given moment.
 - Q. DM stands for David Miscavige?
 - A. Yeah.
 - Q. So he had the authority to assign you

various posts In your capacity as safety ofticer 1 2 depending upon what he felt you should be doing? 3 Or as -- no. As opposed to what kind of -- okay. Yeah, I'll go along with that. 4 5 And at that time Mr. Miscavige was continuing to function as special project Ops? 6 7 Among other things, yes. 8 Ο. Do you recall any other assignments Mr. Miscavige had at that time? 9 10 He was the chairman of the board for ASI, also probably his most illustrious title 11 of all was simply DM. In fact, on the computer 12 network he was identified as either chairman of 13 the board, special projects Ops or DM. 14 15 And Mr. Mayo was also present, I Ο. 16 believe, you testified earlier at Gilman Hot Springs 1982, 1983? 17 18 Α. That actually occurred during the perio

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when I was in the RPF in 1982.

Q.What does it mean to be assigned to the RPF in Scientology?

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MR. HELLER: Objection. It's a vague question.

THE WITNESS: It means that one is removed from one's position within the organization. One is stripped of any rank, any rating, any position, any dignity, assigned to a group of persons who are considered and treated as outcasts, made to wear a special uniform identifying themselves as a member of this particular group.

They are forced to do hard labor from -j-work very, very long hours even longer than normaJL staff. They are assigned a condition -- they are allowed to arise to no condition above liability. They're initially assigned a condition of at leasjt treason.

out of trash cans and so forth, that they're not allowed to wear their normal clothes. They're nojt allowed to eat normal rations. They're forced to eat whatever may be left over from other crew eating. Early on they were actually assigned to chain lockers aboard ships.

1 MR. HELLER: Before you asjc your next: 2 question, we're about twenty minutes or so, 3 Counsel, when you were going to break for lunch. 4 It's now over that time. 5 MR. BRIGHT: Why don't I go for about 6 another ten minutes and we'll break at 12:30. 7 How's that? 8 MR. HELLER: Okay. HELLER: I'm going to move to strik4 23 as nonresponsive. The question I heard was a yes! 24 25 or no question.

THE WITNESS: Well, I'd rather just give 1 you information. 2 MS. McRAE: Now you can answer his last 3 question. 4 THE WITNESS: The point is -- okay. 5 б that particular time okay there was no formal RPF at Gilman. Okay. When somebody was assigned to 7 the RPF from Gilman Hot Springs, they were 8

normally sent to Los Angeles. Mayo and others, okay, seniority when they were assigned to that particular status, they were not allowed to go to Los Angeles or any other RPF's because of their prior positions. Okay. So they were kept there on the base.

Now, that contradicted Hubbard's earlier orders of not having an RPF at the base, so they didn't call it an RPF even though effectively it was the same thing.

MR. HELLER: Move to strike as nonresponsive. Also it consists of hearsay.

THE WITNESS: I was there.

- Was there such a thing as a restricted Ο. list at Gilman?
 - Α. Oh, yes.

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What was the restricted list at Gilman Q.

Hot Springs?

- A. Anytime a person was below the condition of normal, okay, if you happened to be familiar with ethics conditions, if one was below a condition of normal, one was put on the restricted list. He was considered a risk and not allowed to leave the base.
- Q. Did you have any duties in respect to the restricted list?
- A. Yes. It was my job to oversee that it was in force.
- Q. Now, the ethics conditions that you described specifically liability and treason, would a person so labeled be considered a threat to the organization of Scientology?
- A. Absolutely. In fact, that's why they're termed liability; below liability, enemy; below enemy is treason.
 - Q. Do you know what ethics condition --
 - A. There's doubt in there, too.
- Q. Do you know what ethics condition, if any, was assigned to Mr. Mayo while he was performing these RPF like activities at Gilman Hoit Springs?

MR. HELLER: Object. Lack of

foundation. 1 2 THE WITNESS: I know that Mr. Mayo was 3 on the restricted list and in lower conditions, 4 was not personally involved in his ethics handlinch 5 and cannot tell you exactly what condition. б Was Mr. Mayo free to come and go while Ο. 7 he was on a lower ethics condition assignment? 8 Α. Absolutely not. 9 MR. HELLER: Objection as to lack of 10 foundation. 11 Who instructed you to restrict Q. 12 Mr. Mayo's movement in and out of Gilman Hot 13 Springs? 14 MR. HELLER: Objection. Assumes facts 15 not in evidence as well as lack of foundation. 16 THE WITNESS: David Miscavige, Steve 17 Marlow, Pat Broeker. 18 0. And did you attempt to carry out their 19 wishes in regards to restricting Mr. Mayo's ingress and egress from Gilman Hot Springs? 20 21 Α. Sure. 22 How did you do that? O. Well, as I stated earlier, I oversaw the 23 Α.

security force. I issued orders concerning

Mr. Mayo not being able to leave.

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- Q~. What did you tell the security personnel concerning Mr. Mayo's ability to come and go freely?
 - A. That he was restricted.

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Q. Did you tell them to forcibly stop him from leaving if he tried?

MR. HELLER: Objection. Leading.

THE WITNESS: I don't recall specifically saying that, although, it was understood.

- Q. Were these security personnel armed?
- A. They carried -- yes, they were. They carried PR 24 police batons, which were originally known as -- well never mind. Anyway, PR 24's.

 They carried handcuffs. They carried Mace and they had access to firearms.
- Q. When you say had access to firearms, dick each security officer have his own firearm or was there a central location where they were kept?
- A. There was central locations within the security office where assault rifles, .45 automatics were kept, and, I'm sorry, and shotguns.
- Q. Did the security guards under your command at Gilman Hot Springs have use of guard

dogs?

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- A. It wasn't under my command initially, but, yes.
- Q. Are you familiar with the term running program?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Did you ever see Mr. Mayo assigned to the running program at Gilman Hot Springs?
 - A. Oh, yes.
- Q. Define what it entailed to be assigned in the running program at Gilman Hot Springs.
- A. Okay. Also, I know firsthand of this because I was a case supervisor for the running program. The running program was a breakthrough by L. Ron Hubbard whereby a person was required to run around a brightly colored pole approximately, if I recall correctly, fifty feet from the pole in one direction and one direction only for the entire day, meaning we're talking about fifteen of so hours per day.

When the person was no longer physically capable of running, he was to walk until he recuperated enough to be able to run. This was to be done all day, every day, regardless of whether it was freezing outside or a hundred and fifteen

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degrees. And this was to be continued — the running program had a specific person known as the running program IC who was out there to oversee that these people did run and continued to run, the ensure that if they sat for more than ten minutes or so at any given time, they were to be gotten up and forced to continue running.

This process was to continue for weeks and months until the person had achieved the desired result, which could vary from person to person, but was generally put into, I guess, what could be charitably called an amenable state of mind.

- Q. By amenable state of mind, you mean amenable to the wishes of the Scientology organization?
 - A. Exactly.
- Q. Which at that time would be David Miscavige?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Pat Broeker?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Steve Marlow?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Did you personally observe Mr. Mayo in

the running program at Gilman Hot springs? 1 In fact, Mr. Mayo was one of the Α. Yes. 2 first, if not the first person, ever put on a 3 running program. He was enraged. 2 I saw a communication from Hubbard where he was really off the wall, bouncing off the wall about 3 the fact that Mayo was up there being somewhat 4 successful and successfully competing with the 5 church. 6 7 Was the communication you observed from Ο. Hubbard written or oral? 8 9 Α. Written. In what form was the communication? 10 Ο. 11 Α. Dispatches is that what you mean? 12 Well, was it a telex? Was it a letter? Ο. 1.3 Α. No. Dispatches. 14 And what's a dispatch? Q. Oh, outside of the church I mean I 15 Α. suppose you're right, I'd call it a memo type 16 17 communication. How do you know the memo was from 18 0. Hubbard? 19 Because it carried designation that had 20 Α.

been assigned to identify Hubbard's

communication.

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A. Well, when Hubbard went underground and was trying to hide the fact that he was running

- the church, they changed it so that instead ot 1 putting love Ron or that sort of thing at the end 2 of a dispatch, they'd put three pound symbols 3 evenly spaced across the bottom. The dispatch 4 would be done in a certain way, I mean, certain 5 margins, certain indentations. The way it was 6 laid out was totally specific to Hubbard's 7 communications. 8
 - Q. Do you recall the approximate date that you observed the dispatch from Hubbard which indicated the AAC should be wiped out?

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- A. Well, it was more than one dispatch and it would have been -- when I actually saw those things, it would have probably been in early '84, maybe still in '83.
- Q. Do you recall any of the specific content of the dispatches?
 - A. If you mean word for word, no.
 - Q. Do you recall the subject matter?
- A. Oh, yeah. He was really going on about AAC, I mean, just really being pissed off.
- Q. Do you recall any of the specific language that he used?
- A. To just get off of this for one second,

 I just thought of something you asked me earlier

about verbal communication. There was some vercal communication passed on to me from Hubbard, but that's a separate thing.

O. All right.

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Hubbard believed and stated in policy Α. 5 that anybody who splintered from Scientology and 6 formed what they called a squirrel group was doom 7 to failure. If indeed Mayo was not failing, but 8 in fact was being successful, it was viewed by 9 Hubbard as a failing on the part of management. 10 I mean it couldn't be that you could just 11 be up there and be successful. It had to be 12 because he wasn't being taken out. And so he was 13 very pissed off about the whole thing. 14

1 MR. BRIGHT: Let me explain my comments 2 so there's no misunderstanding on the record. 3 All right. MR. HELLER: BRIGHT: What I'm making clear by 4 MR. 5 saying I have more questions is I felt compelled by the time constraints that we have imposed upon 6 7 us to afford you adequate opportunity to cross. And because of the geographical location of the 8 deposition being several thousands miles away from 9 where we all practice law, I feel compelled to 10 11 afford you that opportunity. 12 Now what I'm indicating by my comments 13 is there's others I would like to cover. But 14 because a certain amount of time has elapsed, I feel for me to cover them now would interrupt 15 16 effective cross-examination on your part, so, therefore, I am willing to rest subject to 17 Mr. Fagelbaum covering a few areas. So my plan at that point was to work out a plan concerning backup tapes. We started doing backup tapes -- these are big tapes. They're like

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twelve, fourteen, sixteen inches. I don't know.
I had gotten what are called degouzing machines.
They're simply machines that demagnetize tapes and
take all the information out of them. They were
the biggest and the best you could buy. They were
about -- shoot, three feet by three feet with a
belt that went across the top. And you sit the
tape on top and it went across the belt, fell off
the other side blank. Okay.
         We set up a rack of four of these
machines, I believe it was, in Los Angeles and one
or two of them in Gilman. Everything I'm
referring to in LA is also duplicated in Gilman.
What we did is we then -- this whole thing was
rather complicated, but it was actually kind of
ingenious how it worked. They did daily backups
and they did weekly backups. On weekly backups
that meant that there would be a set of tapes
which contained all of the information available
in the computers period. Okay. I'm sorry.

also concerned ASI. I left them out of it.
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had a separate computer back there.

Now, these tapes like on a Saturday,
okay, everything that's on the tapes was copied on
these backups. Okay. Then sometime the next

coupleof days -- well, okay. What we had done Us 1 2 we had gone out to three counties. The reason we 3 used different counties was hopefully to throw in 4 jurisdictional problems with law enforcement. So we had Ventura County. We had Orange County. 5 We had Riverside County. All of them outside of LA 6 County being where the tapes were originated from, 7 so hopefully this could screw everybody up. 8 9 What we did is we picked storage areas 10 in all three of these areas, and we made them --11 fixed them up so that you could store tapes 12 them. Okay. You know, like put wooden platforms down and so forth to keep them off the ground in 13 case they got water in there and all this sort of 14 stuff. 15 16 So on Saturday or Sunday a guard in 17

regular civilian clothes and so forth would take just plain-looking boxes and load them into a vehicle. The vehicle would change on a regular basis and would just leave. Make sure he wasn't being followed and go to one of these three locations. We rotated the three locations.

Okay. We never used two of them in a row.

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They would go to that location and drop off this week's backup tapes. He would then pick

~\rp last week's backup tapes, bring them back to 1 the base. We would take them into the computer 2 room. We would then have a drill where the tapes 3 would be put up just like they're regular computer 4 tapes, and we'd have a raid drill where the people 5 would have to take the tapes and get them all 6 erased real quick. And then we'd time it to make 7 sure, you know, we were ready to do this at a 8 moment's notice and do it within the time we'd 9 allotted ourselves, you know, due to all these 10 barriers we put up. 11 Q. Stop just for a second. Are you saying 12 that after one week tapes that were -- at one time 13 were your backup tapes were now erased? 14 Α. Yes. 15 Ο. So then you had no further backup tape? 16 No. No. No. You weren't following Α. 17 us. There was a new set of backup tapes replaced 18 those. When you went out to the storage area, you 19 left the new backup ones and picked up last week's 20 backup ones. 21 The new backup tapes --Q. 22 Had everything. 23 Α. They were cumulative? Q. 24 25 Yes. Α.

- Q. Would you say there were both weekly and daily backups?
- A. Yeah. The daily backups -- okay. Do you know how computers work and stuff? Okay.

 Like you have a computer. Okay. You come to work today and you work on your computer. All right.

 Now at the end of that day, all that work that you just did is -- you do a backup, so that's saved.

 So if anything happens, you've still got that tomorrow morning. Okay. Now, in the weekly backup, this Saturday when you do a backup, that daily backup then becomes superfluous.
- Q. So what were the daily backups, floppy disks?
- A. No. These were not IBM PC's. These were like gargantuan Wycat -- Wycat computers.
 - Q. When were the daily backups destroyed?
- A. They were rotated on a regular basis. think they kept three sets of daily backups or something like that.

- Q. Were they always kept on-site or were they at anytime shipped off-site, the daily backups?
 - A. No. They were just kept on-site.

 That's what I'm saying. You could never lose -the absolute worse scenario is you'd get raided or
 Saturday morning and lose everything since last
 Saturday night. But that's all you'd lose.
 - Q. Were you also responsible for tape retrieval or document retrieval?
 - A. What does that mean?

- Q. If you wanted to see a certain dispatch or a certain report that was contained on a tape and somebody ordered that and it was on a tape that was in one of the remote storage facilities --
- A. No. There was nothing at that remote storage facility that was not right here and now.
- Q. Because the tapes that were on-site had the cumulative knowledge that you needed?
- A. Yes, all the way up until right this minute.
- Q. So it was not necessary to go to the remote site?
 - A. No.

It would be only necessary if the 1 2 on-site material was destroyed? 3 Α. Correct. Now, when L. Ron Hubbard died in 1986, Ο. 4 why did your responsibility regarding tape 5 security change? 6 7 A. Because I was sent to Creston, the location of Hubbard's last upper level process and 8 put in charge of security there and in charge of 9 10 the other ranches. Do you know who took your place with 11 respect to the responsibility for the computer 12 tapes? 13 Phillip Jepson, Jepson -- whatever the 14 15 guy who was in charge of security in LA. Can you spell his name to the best of -16 Ο. J-e-p-s-o-n, I believe, Jepson. 17 18 safety officers, he was my LA rep or whatever. Can you give me some idea of the volume 19 of tapes that we're talking about at least as of 20 1986 stored at the three storage facilities? 21 Α. God, I don't know. It seems like it 22 would be at least ten boxes and each box would be 23 a pretty good size. You know, it could probably 24

hold at least five or six tapes each box.

Q. So between fifty and sixty tapes?

Α.

- A. I can remember when we'd do our drill to destroy them, we'd put them on a rack. They had these special racks that hold computer tapes and they'd all be across there. There'd be at least -- oh, yeah, sure.
- Q. And would these ten boxes be distributed among the three storage facilities?

Negative. One storage facility for one

- week. Oh, I actually left out one little twist on this, which was that we rotated the three locations. In other words, if I went out to Orange County and dropped off the tapes today I'd pick up the old ones and bring them back, drill, and destroy them. Next week I'd pick up the tapes, the new ones, take them to Riverside County, drop them off, pick up the old ones, and then the next week Ventura. Well, then if you're following what I'm saying that first week in Orange County didn't get destroyed for three weeks.
 - Q. And what was the reason for that?
- A. Well, number one, we didn't want to go to one location more than once a week -- I mean more than twice -- more than -- we didn't want to

go anywhere twice in a row number one. And it's considered good policy when you're dealing with backups to have more than one set of backups in case there's anything wrong. This is common in the computer industry.

- Q. When you had the responsibility of being the safety officer, which included the responsibility for tape security in storage, who did you report to on this responsibility?
- A. Well, I was given that function by Davidj
 Miscavige. I was to report back to him with a
 plan. I think it was the next day I reported
 back. We had the same meeting, same people
 attending, and I told him my plan and, great,
 implement it.
- Q. And was it necessary for you to continually report on an ongoing basis on the status of storage facilities and retention?

 A. No.
- Q. What if something happened to you, who else knew about the locations of the storage facilities and the status of the computer tapes?
- A. There was only two through -- let's see. Phillip Jepson knew. He was the safety officer LA. And I can't remember the INCOMM

security chief, but he was a tall blondish sort of guy. I can't remember his name. He knew about it. There was a guy by the name of Eric Irgens ir Gilman. We used to call him his nickname fingers. And --

MR. HELLER: What was his name, Eric what?

THE WITNESS: Irgens, I-r-g-e-n-s or maybe E-r. I'm not sure. And Kenny Seybold, who I kept trying to make him my deputy safety officer, and so I had him briefed on it. And then, I guess, that's about it. Oh, I had another guy work for me. His name was Charlie -- what the hell was his name? Anyway, he knew -- I think he knew at least part of it.

- Q. Did you call him Charlie or Chuck?
- A. Charlie, I think.
- Q. Did you have anybody working for you by the name Paul Kellerhaus?
 - A. Oh, sure.

- Q. Did he also know?
- A. I don't recall him knowing, but he may well have before it was all over with.
 - Q. Why do you say that? What was his --
 - A. Because he was the deputy security chief

1 in Gilman, and he would have probably knownso 2 that he could take action in the event that Kenny 3 Seybold wasn't around. 4 MR. HELLER: Strike as speculative 5 answer. 6 Q. Do you know if there were any index to 7 the various computer tapes? 8 I don't know what you mean by -necessarily what you mean by index. 9 10 So that somebody would know what was on 11 each computer tape. 12 A. Well, it would be on the computer tape 13 itself. 14 It would have an index on it? 15 A. Yeah. That's the way computer 16 information --Q. A menu so to speak? 17 A. If you want to get technical, they're 18 called FAT tables, F-A-T, which stands for file 19 allocation tables. And it's what tells the 20 computer how to -- where to find whatever it is 21 you're looking for on the floppy disk tape or 22 whatever. 23

Q. Were you aware of any orders which directed you not to make such tapes available in case they were requested in litigation?

A. That would be like being told that you had to eat breakfast. I mean that's like, are you kidding. I mean that's like nobody would even entertain such a thought.

MR. HELLER: Move to strike as nonresponsive.

Q. Were you aware of these tapes ever being reviewed to determine whether they had any communications that were responsive to document requests in litigation?

A. First of all, information that was of a sensitive nature was not made privy to everybody just coming down the road who had a computer terminal on their desk. Okay. There were security levels and you had passwords and so forth to access different information. This information, the type of information that you'd be talking about would only have a select handful of people that would have access to it, and it's just never going to happen.

MR. HELLER: I meant to interject an

objection before the question was answered. It was answered rather fast. Lack of foundation.

- Q. Were you ever asked to help participate in responding to any document request in litigation?
- A. No. I was asked to destroy documents from time to time, but I was never asked to give up any for litigation purposes.

MR. HELLER: Move to strike everything before I was never asked.

(Off-the-record discussion.)

MR. FAGELBAUM: Given the constraints of time and our desire to make you available for everyone, at least on this trip, I'm going to conclude my direct exam now and allow Mr. Heller to take your cross-examination.

MR. HELLER: I understand you're through with your direct?

MR. FAGELBAUM: At this time.

MR. HELLER: Meaning you intend to continue questioning or --

MR. BRIGHT: Why don't we dispute the logistics afterwards. Let's just start your cross.

MR. HELLER: No. I want to get this on

the record now in case there is no afterwards.

MR. BRIGHT: There will be an afterwards. Let's just not waste time. We've already brought this up three or four times on the record. The record speaks for itself. It's your turn to cross-examine. There's no reason to argue at this point.

MR. HELLER: Is Mr. Aznaran going to be available here tomorrow to continue his deposition? That's the question I've got now and then I can move from there.

MR. FAGELBAUM: It's our expectation to resume the Vicki Aznaran deposition tomorrow.

MR. HELLER: Well, we won't be here for that. Mr. Aznaran is here. Because I'm not goin to go from deposition to deposition and one cross and this and that, et cetera. Mr. Aznaran is here.

MR. BRIGHT: We'll debate all of this at the conclusion today on the record, if you wish, but let's not waste time now.

MR. HELLER: Well, we'll stop at about five or ten til. Because if, in fact, Mr. Aznaran is, (sic), going to be back, I'm going to catch a plane out of here today.

MR.BRIGHT: If he is going to be back 1 2 or if he's not going to be back? I think I said not. 3 MR. HELLER: If I 4 didn't, I meant it. 5 THE WITNESS: You said is. HELLER: Did I say is? 6 That slips 7 sometimes. 8 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. HELLER: 9 Mr. Aznaran, I was formally introduced 10 Ο. to you at the beginning of the deposition and ther 11 we chatted for a minute or so. 12 13 I believe we've met prior, anyway. 14 Q. And I think we've met once before 15 exactly. And I'm Larry Heller, as you know, what you may or may not recall is that I represent 16 Church of Spiritual Technology. - Q. Mr. Bright went rather quickly through the posts that you held in Scientology, and what I would like to do and to move things along we could

do it in a narrative if there are no problems with that is if you would start with the first post.

Now that's when you came on staff in Scientology.

Tell me each post you had. We'll start with that as well as the years that you held that post.

A. In the sea org or prior included.

- Q. From the very beginning, not when you were a part of what might be classified as public or just taking courses, but when you actually started working on behalf of Scientology or some entity therein.
- A. Okay. In 1973 approximately December I joined staff at the Church of Scientology Mission of the Southwest, Dallas, Texas. At first we more or less had a kind of hey-you type organization with no official posts. Dean Stokes was executive director and the rest of us were gophers.

In the spring, late winter, spring of

1974 Dean Stokes took the other staff to Los

Angeles for training and left me in charge of the mission. Gary Nelson and Hazel Nelson, who are old time scientologists, would come in occasionally. Gary Nelson was auditing me on some simple processes and Harriet Nelson was handling the bookkeeping. Other than that, I was in

1 charge. At that time I had just assumed the 2 status of deputy executive director so that I 3 could answer people's letters and so forth and, 4 you know, was some kind of title. 5 How long did you hold that particular Q. б post? 7 A. It was still pretty loose, I guess, actually looking back on it.

- Q. Did Mr. Stokes train you in these various positions such as the registrar case supervisor auditor?
- A. Okay. On my training as registrar, for example, I was sent to Orange County, California, where there was a successful mission being run by -- I can't remember his name, some guy, and I was sent out there to train as a public registrar.

When was that? Ο.

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Α.

That would have been '74. It wasn't a Α. long period, maybe three weeks something like We were not as official. I mean up there in the franchise world as they are in the sea org. I mean it's kind of like -- as far as posts and all that kind of stuff.

> I understand. Ο.

Α. I did end up becoming executive director of the mission around '77. At that point stokes had gone like totally bozo, was off doing something else, and I was kind of left with the mission.

> How was he going totally bozo? Ο.

He was having these whole track realizations, whole track reverse like past lives, and so forth where that he had realized that actually -- it's almost -- but, anyway, he was realizing that he had played a pretty big part in mankind's state today and that as a result of that, he could get them out of it. - And when people didn't comply with his orders, it was viewed as a —• amongst other things, I mean as well as out ethics and all that other nonsense, it was viewed as a public relations problem.
- Q. Were you responsible for compliance with LRH orders for the entirety of the Flag Land Base?

From that aspect, if it makes sense. Α. 1 2 Q. Well, I'm not sure. Maybe what the problem is I'm saying compliance with LRH's 3 orders. Is that the aspect you're talking about? 4 5 A. Yes. 6 Ο. So if there was an LRH --7 Α. And policy. So any LRH order or policy you were 8 Ο. responsible for compliance in that capacity? 9 10 Okay. Yeah, but it's a different sort 11 of --12 MR. BRIGHT: Well, wait a minute. 13 You're not defining the capacity, so, therefore, 14 I'm objecting. It's vague and ambiguous. 15 MR. HELLER: Well, we are talking about 16 when I say capacity so the record is clear LRH 17 personal public relations Flag crew. And I think 18 that's what we've been dealing with. Number one, obviously, Lynn doesn't have enough ethics presence to get you to comply. Lynn's public PR with you would be out because if you thought well enough of Lynn, you'd be getting those orders done, wouldn't you. That's where I came in.

So if like LRH's orders weren't getting done while everybody was down there getting beat over the head for not getting them done, somebody's going to kind of hit me along side of the head along with everybody else because I must not be doing my job or this situation wouldn't exist.

Q. Were you brought in when there was a problem with compliance only or initially when an order came down to make sure there was compliance?

A. I was not involved with just the nuts and bolts compliance of every order, but more as a general rule. For example, there was what was called the Flag LRH -- the LRH COM office at Flag. This is the LRH communications office in there, communicator office in Flag.

This was a whole -- this is where LRH

communicators, the office they operated out of with one or two assigned every organization there at Flag. Okay. Now one of their functions was to get compliance to LRH orders. Okay. As they failed and were not getting that compliance, I was then given the problem of getting the LRH COM's, quote, unquote on source so that they would be in turn getting compliance to these orders. It's all -- it's kind of like they tried to get compliance this way. That didn't work. So they backed up and tried to get it this way.

I mean you had LRH COM's initially supposed to get compliance of LRH orders in the organizations. They failed. Out of that evolved the commodore's messenger organization. It was their job to get orders. The personal office, it was their job to give out orders. I mean it was all just from different views, I guess, to get the same job done.

- Q. How would you go about getting compliance when it was a necessity for you to do so?
- A. Oh, what I would be expected to do is put together a program outlining what steps I felt would be -- or, you know, should be taken. I

would submit this to my seniors and generally up to LRH, and then it would come down to LRH program looks good, get it done, more or less. So as an example, LRH came out with an executive directive numbered -- Number 302, and it was called -..- oh, God. What the hell did they call it? Debug technology. I mean, in other words, how to get -- when you're trying to get something done and it was just bugged and you couldn't get it done you're supposed to go through these steps and that would get you through it.

So the idea was LRH made this breakthrough on this debug tech. It was my job to present this breakthrough to the staff in such a way so that they would all just run out and do it, and all this stuff would get accomplished, and everything would be wonderful. Okay. So I had to put together this whole program complete with posters on the wall and slogans and, you know, all kinds of crap.

- Q. So is it your understanding that there were at least some criminal acts, if not extensive criminal acts, that may have been performed that the people who sent you on this mission did not know about and wanted to learn about?

1 Yeah. MR. BRIGHT: I'm going to object. 2 Assumes facts not in evidence and you're leading 3 4 the witness and mischaracterizing his testimony 5 all at the same time. MR. In other words, if -- let's say you had committed a crime. Well, who all knew about it. I mean how much in risk are we here, I mean, you know, is Lynn going to blow the whistle.
- Q. Right. So part of it was finding out what crimes were committed and another part was finding out who knew about it?
 - A. Yeah, determining what level of threat

or whatever.

- Q. Is my characterization correct: One, find out what happened, what crimes were committed; two, find out who knew about these crimes?

discuss that sort of thing with an outsider anyway, if you understand what I'm saying. He wasn't, you know, a trusted person. He was a hired gun. You know what I'm saying.

- Q. Yeah. Let me try to get you back, to the original question. How did you know that he had conveyed any objections or displeasure he had with attempting to plant incriminating evidence over to any of the group in Los Angeles?
- A. Okay. At the end of our conversation I had tried to gloss it over with him, but he was still like really upset. I mean he had been over there about a week longer than he wanted to be over there, anyway. Okay. He was an upset looking for something to happen about. He was wanting to go home. Okay. So he was all upset about this when he left my room and went to his room. I sat around and I thought about it and I realized I was in a world of shit with Marty, okay, for having dumped this on him, anyway.
- Q. Did he tell you at that point that he had already spoken with Marty?

- MR. BRIGHT: Let me save you the effort because you can't preface your question with how you recall the testimony. You can't ask the witness to comment on what you recall the testimony was.

MR. HELLER: That's a good point, so let me rephrase. I wrote down the quote that you either quoted or paraphrased.

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THE WITNESS: Yeah, I don't believe I quoted anything.

Q. You said they had never actually said it and then you said, this was your quote, we know he's doing something illegal, your job is to catch him, make it go right?

- A. It was LRH's. It was part of his clean house program, but I mean that's kind of like when the shit hit the fan. I mean it didn't really go the way he'd expected it. It was kind of like the Alamo, you know, when they drew the line.
- Q. Sort of. How long were you on this mission when it began in early 1982?
 - A. Just probably a month or so.
 - Q. And then what did you do?
- A. Then I did a renovations mission to -LRH was expected back in about three weeks or four
 weeks or something, an absurd, and I was supposed
 to rebuild Gilman. And so I was sent on this
 mission to do all this renovation and get all this
 stuff done, and then I --
- Q. You mean -- I'm sorry. Go ahead. Do you mean renovate for Mr. Hubbard to live at Gilman?
 - A. That was part of it, yeah.
 - Q. That was the kind of --
- A. I mean just everything. I mean the studios so he could work in it, do this, do that.

 I mean it was everything from repaving roads to building buildings, rebuilding buildings, turning

- an Olympic size swimming pool into a Caribbean -
 some kind of lagoon, you know. Have you been out

 there? Have you seen the ship? We built that

 thing. It was a ship out in the middle of the

 thing. You just wouldn't believe. We did that.
 - Q. So that was a general renovation of the property. And how long did you spend on that?
 - A. Until I went in the RPF.
 - Q. Which was when?
 - A. May.

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- Q. May of 1982?
- A. Yeah.
- Q. Now Mr. Hubbard to your knowledge never did live out in Gilman Hot Springs, correct?
- A. No. That's my understanding that he did visit and stay there a couple of times prior to that.
- Q. Let's go with subsequent to the point where you went through the renovations. Did he ever go through out there?
- A. No. He was just issuing the orders as to what had to get done out there so that he could come back.
- Q. And to your knowledge he never made use of the studios out there?

No. 1 Α. However, there were films made in the 2 Q. 3 studios? Yeah. 4 Α. And those were --5 Q. Eventually. 6 Α. Eventually. For the most part 7 Ο. Scientology promotional films? 8 Not for the most part. I mean I think 9 that was probably about it. 10 Ο. And there is a sound studio out there, 11 too; is that correct? 12 Multi-million dollar sound studio, yes. 13 And are those Scientology sound records Q. 14 promotional sound records that were made to your 15 knowledge while you were out there in the studio? 16 Α. Are you talking about cassettes? 17 Are they strictly cassettes? Ο. 18 To my knowledge, yes. Α. 19 So at the studio they don't do any 20 Q. pressing out there. They just make the recording? 21 They might now. I mean when I was there 22 it was just cassettes. 23 All the guestions I'm going to ask are 24 Ο. only your personal knowledge while you were out 25

1 there.

- A. Okay.
 - Q. And were those promotional tapes sound tapes?
 - A. Well, they were tapes to be used in courses and just all kinds of different uses.
 - Q. So the master tapes in effect would be made there and then they would be copied somewhere and distributed, these course tapes?
 - A. Well, there's copy masters as opposed to masters. I mean there's all these different generations of tapes and your master masters you never use.
 - Q. Those are stored away?
 - A. Yeah.
 - Q. Did L. Ron Hubbard ever use the sound studio out there to your knowledge?
 - A. Well, he never visited it, but he gave orders telling him to do things there and then they would do it, and they'd send it to him and say okay or not okay. I mean I would say, yes, housed it quite extensively.
 - Q. And he gave orders and used it as you testified for purposes of making course tapes for Scientology?

1 h. And for purposes of putting together 2 LRH's brand of music, you know. 3 For what use? Q. Just to demonstrate to the world how 4 Α. 5 it's supposed to be done. Q. Not for any particular Scientology 6 7 promotional use in that instance? 8 A. Well, I suppose you could call it promotional use unless you heard it. 9 10 Without commenting on your -- I'm trying to get a specific question. So I'm saying without 11 12 commenting on your evaluation of the music, I'm 13 now asking about what it was being used for or contemplated to be used for, either one. Was it 14 15 for the promotion of Scientology? 16 A. It was to make money. I mean to sell 17 these things. 18 Q. Money for Scientology? Yeah. Well, and Hubbard because he'd be 19 Α. 20 the --21 Q. The licensee on these? 22 Yeah. Α. Now, if I'm correct, you started doing 23 Q. this in May of 1982. Is that what you testified 24

to?

Wo~. I believe I said I went to tne Kjf* 1 2 Q. I'm sorry. You did this until May of 3 1982? Α. Yes. 4 And then you went to the RPF? Q. 5 Yes. 6 Α. And you testified you spent ninety-nine Q. 7 days in the RPF? 8 Ninety-nine days. Α. 9 And were you on a running program as Ο. 10 well? 11 Α. Nope. 12 Q. Where was the RPF at that time? 13 Where I was, it was LA. Α. 14 Was that in the blue buildings? Q. 15 Α. Yes. 16 Did you mix with the general populous 17 Ο. there? 18 Α. No. 19 Did you take Scientology courses while Q. 20 you were out at the RPF? 21 Occasionally. 22 Α. What were the nature of those courses? Q. 23 Α. Did I take any courses? Yeah. I must 24 have taken some. I mean I'm sure ethics courses, 25

you know, that sort of thing. I had already done 1 most of the courses that you have to do when you 2 go to the RPF, which is why I was out there in 3 ninety-nine days instead of two or three years. 4 Q. And what was the reason you were given 5 being put in the RPF? 6 Α. I was told it was because -- well, in 7 public or private? 8 Ο. Well, the reason you were given. 9 The reason I was given? HELLER: I must have been in another 7 room for the last four days where I heard about 8 9 fifteen hours worth of testimony dealing with the 10 RPF, and now I've asked about fifteen minutes and we have nothing do with direct. 11 12 MR. FAGELBAUM: Well, is this Dallas or 13 Hollywood? MR. HELLER: Well, it doesn't matter --14 MR. FAGELBAUM: We've listened to about 15 16 movies. We've listened to about, you know, music• Where did you find that in direct exam with Mr. 17 18 Aznaran? 19 MR. HELLER: Well, I assumed -- well, 201 let's not go back into history. I assume you're 21 now objecting to me asking about his experiences 22 in the RPF. Now I listened all about the RPF, and 23 I'd like to ask some questions about the RPF 24 myself.

MR. FAGELBAUM: Okay. Fine.

MR. HELLER: Thank you.

Q. I think I was at the point where you said in some instances it was a vacation because you're working so hard at Gilman in the renovations. By that did you mean to say that the work was easier?

A. No.

Q. You got more sleep?

A. No. In fact, when I got to Los Angeles they were doing renovations there and we went days without sleep. However --

Q. So you're a renovation expert at that point?

A. Absolutely. The main difference and this is the part that I'm referring to is the fact that in Gilman I was the one in charge, and I was the one forced in my eyes to be committing atrocities over the people who were working for me to try to get the job done. Whereas in Los Angeles, I was just a flunky, so I didn't have that side of it to contend with.

Q. Did you also sleep somewhere in the blue buildings as well, and the whole RPF took place in the blue buildings?

A. I'm trying to think where we did sleep.

Q^What I'm trying to get to is: Did you 1 2 go off of these premises for any of this work that 3 you did? 4 A. No. It was the basement or something. I don't remember. 5 6 Q. You were separated from the public in 7 some manner? 8 Α. Yeah. MR. FAGELBAUM: Scientology public or 9 10 people in the street public? THE WITNESS: Well, we were separated 11 12 from everybody. 13 Q. Scientology public is what I'm talking about that went in and out? 14 15 A. Yeah. You know, I told you we had to 16 wear the nasty-looking clothes and eat by ourselves and go through all that, everything I 17 described earlier. As you know, Mr. Mayo • s RPF which by the earlier testimony was attributed to was at 6 Gilman Hot Springs, and he's talking about an 7 8 entirely different location. You've made no effort to tie up the two were similarly run, 9 10 similarly constituted, and there's no foundation 11 whatsoever. MS. McRAE: And I'd also would like to 12 13 add, Mr. Heller, and I'm not accusing you of doing 14 this, but if it's your attention to get some 15 discovery or something in any of the other cases, 16 that's not what we're here for today. I can say yes I could have left all of my worldly possessions, my clothes, my dogs, my wife, 8 and physically walked out the door and disappeared 9 into never never land, yes. But I mean by that 10 you mean to imply that it was just some free and 11 easy kind of thing that, well, gee guys, you know, 12 I'd really not do this and, you know, escape 13 unscathed, no. 14 15 0. No. I didn't mean to apply that. What I really meant to ask you was: Whether you were 16 physically restrained in that building? 17 Aside from the fact that I didn't even 18 Α. have enough money for that bus you're talking 19 about, yeah, I could have definitely walked off 20 and joined the ranks of the homeless or 21 something. 22 (Off-the-record discussion.) 23 24 The question I meant to ask and I wanted, Ο. to make it clear. We were talking about off the

1 record about possible implications in my question; 2 the question which I didn't mean. The question I wanted to ask is and limit it strictly to: Were 3 4 you physically restrained in the RPF? No. Α. 5 6 Was it your understanding that if you left that your wife would not come along with you? 7 8 It was my understanding that they would 9 do everything in their power to keep her from coming with me. 10 11 And you didn't have an understanding one way or another whether she would respect that and 12 13 come with you or not? MR. BRIGHT: Objection. Speculation. 14 15 Also relevancy. THE WITNESS: I mean I don't know what 16 I --. I mean it was not something I was interested 17 18 in putting to the test I can tell you that. Q. Did you have the possessions that you 19 owned -- and, by the way, did you own a car at 20 that point in time? 21 I don't remember. I don't think so. 22 Α. Did your wife own a car? 23 0. Wait a minute. Wait a minute. No, we 24 Α. sold that. No. She wouldn't have owned one if I 25

Q. Define routing out for me.

- A. Okay. Routing out is when a person expresses a desire to leave Scientology staff. He is put on a check sheet, which gives different number of steps which one has to go through to leave amicably supposedly. Amongst this is all kinds of auditing that you have to go through, ethics handlings that you have to through, PTS, which is potential trouble source handling you have to go through, all these different things that you have to go through before you can get out. I've seen people take over six months trying to get out doing one of those things. I mean it's not as easy as it sounds. Could I have?
 - Q. Yes.
- A. Well, also, I have to say that everything on that checklist is designed to try to keep you from leaving. So when you get on that checklist, the fact that you've got on that checklist does not mean that you can successfully complete it because everybody's trying to keep you from leaving.
- Q. Do you consider that when you left from Scientology you routed out?
 - A. When I left?

Q. Yes, sir.

- A. When I left, it was kind of like one of those kind of miracles, you know what I mean. It was kind of one of those things where it just never happened before out of the anals of Scientology.
 - Q. Did you consider you routed out?
- A. I would not have used that word. I mean I can use that word loosely, I guess, but not per the standard what would be standardly known as routing out within the church, but that's our case.
- Q. You answered it. Okay. Would you say that when you left it was a lot quicker than the normal routing process that you had been exposed to that you just testified about?
- A. No. That's my case. That has nothing to do with this that I know of.

MS. McRAE: Mr. Heller, if you'll explain to me what this has to do with this case, and I don't think it will take a big explanation, because I really fail to see it and he's not here --

MR. HELLER: Okay. And I will and I understand your point because you're concerned

that I'm talking about his case, and I don't know if this has been covered in your case or not. I haven't read your depositions in that case. But in this case there has been testimony with regard to Mr. Mayo leaving Scientology. There has been testimony that I've heard and it's gone both ways as a matter of fact as to how Mr. Mayo left Scientology.

I am going to ultimately get to what this witness knows about Mr. Mayo leaving Scientology. I think it's relevant with regard to his experiences of being able to leave Scientology and leaving Scientology regarding the general practice, which is, I think, what we've been testifying to here as well as the specific facts of Mr. Mayo leaving Scientology.

Now, if it reassures you all, I will tell you that I don't intend to get too deeply into this. I'm maybe going to ask another question or two. In fact, I may just kind of -- depending on the answer, leave it at that question.

MS. McRAE: I think he said his experience was unique and so, yeah, if you've got one more question, go ahead. But wait a minute
