### Part II, Question 1 - Description of Activities

Church of Scientology Flag Service Organization, Inc. ("CSFSO") was incorporated as a Florida nonprofit religious corporation on May 19, 1981 for the purpose of practicing and propagating the Scientology religion and providing a religious retreat for the ministry of the highest levels of Scientology religious services. CSFSO is the largest church of Scientology in the world. Because it ministers Scientology religious services that are available nowhere else in the world, CSFSO fulfills a unique role in the international Scientology ecclesiastical hierarchy.

CSFSO's activities are described fully below. Detailed information concerning the organizational structure, religious activities and financial affairs of the Scientology ecclesiastical hierarchy and related organizations is contained in the administrative record of the exemption determination proceeding for Church of Scientology International ("CSI"), the Mother Church of the Scientology religion.

# The Scientology Religion

Scientology is a religion based upon the research, writings and recorded lectures of its founder, L. Ron Hubbard, which collectively constitute the Scripture of the religion. The Scientology Scriptures are the sole source of all the doctrines, tenets, sacraments, rituals and policies of the Scientology faith. They encompass more than 500,000 pages of writings, nearly 3,000 taped lectures and over 100 films.

The basic tenet of the Scientology religion is that man is an immortal spirit who is basically good and ethical who has lived through countless previous lifetimes and who will live again and again. Although he has a mind and a body, he is himself a spiritual being. The ultimate goal of Scientology is "a civilization without insanity, without criminals and without war, where the able can prosper and honest beings can have rights, and where Man is free to rise to greater heights."

The principal religious practices in Scientology are "auditing" and "training," which consist of a gradient scale of religious services addressing the spirit. The purpose of auditing is to unburden man of past painful experiences and to orient him as a spiritual being. Auditing results in an increase in spiritual awareness and ability. Ultimately the person achieves certainty of himself as a spirit and freedom from unwanted burdens. At this point he also is certain of

immortality. "Training" also increases spiritual awareness and ability for the individual and enables a person to utilize the religious technologies of Scientology to improve conditions with himself or herself and others.

Scientology is an exact faith, and a fundamental doctrine of the religion is that its religious services must be orthodox. It holds that spiritual salvation can be attained if, and only if, the path to salvation outlined in the Scripture's religious technology is followed without deviation.

### The Scientology Religious Hierarchy

Churches of Scientology that minister religious services to the public are arranged in a hierarchy that reflects the gradient nature of the spiritual levels of Scientology.

At the base of the religious hierarchy of Scientology are independent ministers and missions of Scientology which minister auditing to the spiritual level of Clear and lower-level and introductory training services. Class V churches of Scientology also minister all auditing levels that are ministered by missions, plus the Clear Certainty Rundown, which verifies whether or not the state of Clear has been achieved. Class V churches also train and ordain ministers and provide religious training to the level of Class V auditor. Saint Hill churches minister all of the levels of the churches below them as well as religious training to the level of Class VII auditor. Organizations minister the auditing levels of the churches below them as well as the confidential advanced auditing levels up to the spiritual level of New OT V, and religious training to the level of Class VIII auditor. The Church of Scientology Flag Service Organization ministers auditing to the spiritual level of New OT VII and the highest levels of religious training, Class XII auditor. The highest level of auditing, New OT VIII, is ministered only by the Church of Scientology Flag Ship Service Org aboard the M.V. Freewinds.

### The Church's Activities

CSFSO is the largest single church of Scientology in the world and has approximately **750** staff members. It is a religious retreat for Scientologists from every nationality, providing the highest levels of Scientology religious services (other than New OT VIII, which is ministered only by Church of Scientology Flag Ship Service Organization).

CSFSO carries out a unique ministry and fulfills a singular role in the Scientology religious hierarchy as the only church of Scientology that ministers religious training to the highest level, Class XII, and the only church that ministers the auditing levels of New OT VI and New OT VII as well as other special auditing services.

In addition to these high-level services available only at CSFSO, CSFSO also ministers all of the Scientology auditing and religious training levels ministered by churches below CSFSO in the religious hierarchy. What sets CSFSO apart with respect to these services is that it provides parishioners with a distraction-free, wholly supportive environment so they can make the most possible spiritual advancement without interference from the turbulence of the secular world. Because of the environment provided and the high level of expertise of CSFSO's staff, Scientologists come from all over the world to CSFSO for all levels of Scientology services.

CSFSO ministers religious services in three buildings located near each other in downtown Clearwater: the former Fort Harrison Hotel, which contains both accommodations for parishioners as well as specially-designed auditing rooms and areas for the direct ministration of auditing; the former Sandcastle hotel, which contains specially-designed rooms for ministering the most advanced auditing levels; and another large rented building used for the ministry of religious training. Church of Scientology Religious Trust ("CSRT"), a reserves trust for the Scientology religion, (see response to Part II, Question 5), is in the process of constructing another building in the same area which CSFSO will lease, to provide more facilities for CSFSO's ministry.

CSFSO\*s religious retreat setting is especially conducive to Scientology's advanced auditing levels, which are ministered by way of "solo auditing," whereby the parishioner audits him or herself. For parishioners on such levels their accommodations very often serve also as their auditing rooms, where they can solo audit without any distraction or disturbance.

The corporate entity CSFSO is comprised of the following four ecclesiastical bodies.

1. Flag Service Org. Flag Service Org ministers religious services to CSFSO's parishioners. This ecclesiastical body includes all of the auditors, case supervisors, course supervisors and other staff directly involved in ministering services, as well as executive and administrative staff that

perform necessary support functions such as personnel, communications, ethics, treasury and finances, administration and dissemination. The highest ecclesiastical position in the Flag Service Org is its Captain, who, together with her deputies and other top executives form its executive council, the highest ecclesiastical body in the organization. Beneath the executive council is an advisory council, comprised of the heads of each of the Flag Service Org's divisions. These two bodies, subject to ecclesiastical management advice and direction from senior ecclesiastical organizations (which are described below), direct the day-to-day and week-to-week activities of the Flag Service Org.

- 2. Flag Crew Org. The Flag Crew Org performs direct support functions for Flag Service Org and other ecclesiastical bodies within CSFSO. The Flag Crew Org maintains the buildings and property of CSFSO; maintains and operates the accommodations and food facilities of CSFSO's religious retreat; and berths, feeds and otherwise communally supports CSFSO's staff. The Flag Crew Org-has its own Captain, executive council and advisory council which direct its activities.
- 3. Flag Land Base. Flag Land Base is an ecclesiastical body within CSFSO that is senior to both the Flag Service Org and Flag Crew Org. Flag Land Base is comprised of a number of executive CSFSO staff personnel responsible for the overall direction and coordination of CSFSO as a whole. This body is headed by the Commanding Officer Flag Land Base, who is the highest ecclesiastical official in CSFSO\*s hierarchy. Whereas the Captains of the Flag Service Org and Flag Crew Org are primarily concerned with the activities of their respective ecclesiastical organizations, the Commanding Officer Flag Land Base and his staff consider CSFSO's activities as a whole.
- 4. Commodore's Messenger Org Clearwater ("CMO CW"). CMO CW oversees and ensures the implementation of programs that CSFSO receives from the Commodore's Messenger Org International, an ecclesiastical body within CSI. These programs can relate to all facets of CSFSO's activities from the conduct of religious services to the acquisition and renovation of buildings, and unusual or ongoing legal or financial matters.

The senior executives of CSFSO's ecclesiastical bodies make up a Coordination Council that regularly meets to coordinate activities of the organization as a whole.

# The Scientology Religious Marks and Advanced Technology

The churches and other organizations that comprise Scientology's ecclesiastical hierarchy recognize CSI as the authority on ecclesiastical matters by virtue of its status as the Mother Church. (See the FSO's Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation, Article III, Exhibit B.)

CSI's ecclesiastical authority is further enhanced by a written covenant between it and Religious Technology Center with respect to the use of the Scientology religious marks by churches and other organizations within the ecclesiastical hierarchy. (Religious Technology Center is the owner of the religious marks associated with the Scientology religion.) Through the covenant, Religious Technology Center has given CSI the right and responsibility to permit the organizations of the religion of Scientology to use the marks. Without CSI's written authority to use the marks, and Religious Technology Center's approval, an organization cannot legally use the marks and thus cannot call itself a Scientology organization.

Pursuant to its authority, CSI granted CSFSO the right to use the Scientology religious marks by a written covenant. (Exhibit C.) CSFSO is not required to pay royalties for use of the marks.

CSFSO has entered into an ecclesiastical management agreement with CSI pursuant to which CSI provides CSFSO with ecclesiastical advice, programs and guidance, staff training and general coordination of activities with other Scientology organizations. (A copy of the agreement is attached as Exhibit D.) Scientology administrative policy requires that a management unit or organization be supported by the nearest church organization that ministers religious services to the public. As the largest church of Scientology ministering religious services CSFSO is considered to be the closest such church to CSI. For this reason, and in exchange for the services CSI provides to CSFSO, CSFSO supports CSI's program of activities each week by providing CSI the internal operating costs that CSI incurs.

CSFSO also has entered into agreements with CSI with respect to the orthodox exhibition of films relating to the practice of the Scientology faith (Exhibit E) and the care of confidential information parishioners disclose to it in the ministration of religious services (Exhibit F). CSFSO provides CSI eleven percent of the contributions it receives from parishioners for

training services in exchange for the films. Religious Technology Center also owns the rights to the confidential advanced technology of the Scientology religion in the United States. Religious Technology Center has authorized FSO to use the levels of the advanced technology in accordance with strict Scriptural requirements by written covenant. CSFSO provides RTC six percent of the value of religious services it ministers with respect to the advanced technology. (Exhibit G).

### The Church's Staff Personnel

CSFSO is a "Sea Org" organization, which means its staff members belong to the Scientology religious order, the Sea Organization (or the "Sea Org"). To become members of the Sea Org, CSFSO's staff members must pledge the next billion years of their existence to the Scientology religion. As Sea Org members, CSFSO's staff live and work in a manner befitting their fundamental and total commitment to the Scientology faith.

They live communally in church-provided berthing and eat communally in a church-provided dining room. They are reguired to live on church premises, so they can live free of the distractions of the secular world and be ready to attend to their religious duties at any time during the day or night. As a general matter, each of CSFSO's staff members devotes 14 hours a day to his or her ecclesiastical duties and religious study. Staff are reguired to wear the official uniforms of the Sea Org, which CSFSO provides.

CSFSO's staff personnel are compensated for their ecclesiastical service with a nominal allowance (currently \$50.00 a week) and small bonuses for good performance of their assigned duties, room and board, medical and dental cost (as needed) and child care or school tuition for children. They also may receive commissions from sales of Scientology religious books of 15 percent of the sales price.

### Part 11/ Question 3 - Fundraising Program

CSFSO conducts dissemination campaigns to attract parishioners to CSFSO and to encourage CSFSO's existing parishioners to continue their spiritual advancement. CSFSO sends mailings to its parishioners of dissemination materials including its magazine, Source, which it publishes periodically. (A representative copy of Source is attached as Exhibit H.) CSFSO also has staff personnel who write directly to CSFSO's parishioners encouraging them to come to CSFSO for further

religious services. (Representative copies of dissemination materials sent with such mailings are attached as Exhibit I.)

CSFSO also sends out tours, comprised of two to several CSFSO staff members, who travel to other churches of Scientology to inform their staff and parishioners about recent events at CSFSO and to encourage them to come to CSFSO for religious services. Each of the Flag Operation Liaison Offices and some large churches of Scientology have a staff member holding the position of Flag Service Consultant, who works very closely with CSFSO to assist parishioners in those churches to attend services at CSFSO.

As CSFSO offers the higher level religious services, eventually all Scientologists become parishioners of the CSFSO once they have attained the spiritual advances of the lower levels of auditing and training. Therefore, in addition to its fundraising activities with respect to its own existing and future parishioners, CSFSO also contributes to broadscale dissemination and public relations campaigns that benefit all Scientology organizations and the religion as a whole. These campaigns proselytize the religion to the general public and result in new people coming in to other Scientology churches at all levels of the hierarchy. Eventually, sometimes even years later, many of these individuals become parishioners of CSFSO.

In addition to the above, CSFSO organizes and works closely with Scientologists who do not serve on the staff of a church who either proselytize to the public or assist existing Scientologists in continuing their spiritual advancement. These Scientologists, called "Field Staff Members," play an important part in the dissemination and proselytization of the religion through word of mouth and direct contact. Since the successful efforts of Field Staff Members result in contributions of fixed donations to CSFSO as well as the spiritual advancement of its parishioners, CSFSO pays Field Staff Members a commission when the Scientologists they have been working with begin services at CSFSO. CSFSO staff personnel who serve as registrars and are responsible for CSFSO's fundraising, may, under certain circumstances, receive a very small commission (1/8 to 1/4 percent) of funds they raise.

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### Part II, Question 3 - Fundraising Program

CSFSO also engages in fundraising to support projects that benefit the community, the broad general public or that assist the expansion of Scientology into new areas. For example, CSFSO has helped raise funds to support missionary activities to introduce Scientology in Russia. CSFSO has raised funds to purchase sets of books on Scientology by L. Ron Hubbard to be donated to public libraries throughout the United States. CSFSO has also raised funds which have been donated to The Way To Happiness Foundation, to use in distributing copies of The Way To Happiness, a book containing a non-religious moral code authored by L. Ron Hubbard, to the public.

CSFSO's officers, directors and trustees are not compensated for their service in those capacities. Except for Craig Wilson, each of these individuals also serves in staff positions for CSFSO and are compensated for their work as staff members. These amounts are reflected in the response to Part IV, Line 17.

### Part II, Question 5 - Relationship with Other Organizations

CSFSO's relationship with CSI and Religious Technology Center with respect to ecclesiastical governance and covenants respecting use of the religious marks and the ministry of the Scientology advanced technology are described in the response to Part II, Question 1. CSFSO's relationship with CSI, RTC and other churches of Scientology and their related organizations is discussed in more detail in CSI's administrative record.

CSFSO has a wholly owned for-profit subsidiary, FSO Oklahoma Investments Corporation ("FSO OIC"), that CSFSO established in 1983 for the purpose of investing in oil and gas properties and real estate. FSO OIC has sold all of its investments other than two undeveloped parcels of real estate in Hawaii, which it currently is offering for sale. Other than this remaining real estate, FSO OIC has no other assets and is otherwise dormant.

CSFSO has a special relationship with two trusts that administer advance donations its parishioners contribute for religious services they plan to receive at CSFSO. One, Trust for Scientologists, is a non-U.S. trust that holds unused advance donations for religious services contributed by CSFSO's non-U.S. parishioners, subject to the parishioners' instructions. The other is United States Parishioners Trust, a U.S. trust that holds unused advance donations for religious services contributed by parishioners of two U.S. churches, Church of Scientology Western United States and CSFSO, subject to the parishioners' instructions. Once CSI's exemption is recognized these trusts will dissolve and distribute their assets to appropriate tax exempt organizations recognized under Section 501(c)(3) in accordance with the dissolution clauses of their respective trust instruments.

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### Part 11/ Question 5 - Relationship With Other Organizations

CSFSO also has a special relationship with Church of Scientology Religious Trust ("CSRT $^{\rm M}$ ), a domestic trust which is the principal Scientology entity for reserve needs of United States churches. CSRT is recognized by the Service as exempt under section 501(c)(3). CSRT has made substantial loans to CSFSO over the years for the purpose of supporting CSFSO's operating needs and religious program and for renovations of CSFSO's buildings. The balance of all loans outstanding as of December 31, 1992 is reflected in the financial information submitted in response to Part IV. As described in the response to Part II, Question 1, CSRT is also raising funds to construct a new building which will be leased to CSFSO to expand its facilities used for its ministry of religious services.

One of CSFSO's directors, Janet Herring, is also a trustee of CSRT.

### Part II, Question 7 - Financial Accountability

While CSFSO is responsible for and manages its own finances, it recognizes the ecclesiastical authority of CSI with respect to financial matters that affect the religion. Consequently, CSFSO presents proposals to CSI's Reserves Committee for its approval for expenditure from its reserves accounts. CSFSO also provides CSI weekly reports. A representative copy of such financial reports is included in CSI's administrative record.

#### Part II, Question 9b - Leases

CSFSO leases one of the buildings it uses for ministering religious services from Coachman Downtown Center Associates. The only relationship CSFSO has with this entity is as lessor/lessee. (A copy of this lease and its amendments is attached as Exhibit J.)

CSFSO leases an office in one of its buildings to the Church of Scientology Freewinds Relay Office ("CSFRO"), which has served as a liaison between churches of Scientology and individual Scientologists and the M.V. <a href="Freewinds">Freewinds</a>. Other than their relationship as Scientology religious entities, CSFSO and CSFRO function only as lessor/lessee. (A copy of this lease is attached as Exhibit K.) CSFRO will be dissolved shortly in connection with a reorganization of the organizations that support operation of the <a href="Freewinds">Freewinds</a>.

RTC rents office space from CSFSO on an oral lease for RTC staff personnel who inspect and verify the orthodox ministration of the advanced technology. The monthly rental is \$850.00.

CSFSO has an oral lease for an office in one of its buildings with the Clearwater Membership Tour, an organization that solicits new members and donations for the Scientology membership organization, International Association of Scientologists ("IAS").

CSFSO has an oral lease with Scientology Missions International ("SMI") for its SMI Expansion Office with is located in an office on CSFSO's premises. The SMI Expansion Office has the function of opening Scientology missions in new countries. It is located at CSFSO so its staff can easily contact Scientologists who come to CSFSO from all parts of the world to interest them in becoming missionaries for the religion.

The relationship among CSFSO and organizations making up the Scientology ecclesiastical hierarchy are set forth in detail in the administrative record of CSI's exemption determination proceeding.

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### Part II, Questions 9b - Leases

CSFSO also leases warehouse space in Clearwater from third-parties who have no relationship with CSFSO other than that of lessor/lessee.

### Part II, Questions lla, Determination of Charges

The amounts of contributions required for CSFSO's religious services and the religious books and materials that CSFSO sells are established by the Mother Church, CSI.

CSI's policy for setting contribution rates include the following criteria: all amounts are set to enable churches of Scientology to provide the services, Scriptures and other materials of the religion to more and more members of the general public so that everyone eventually can achieve spiritual salvation. CSI accomplishes this policy by requiring all pricing proposals to undergo extensive review by the executives of the ecclesiastical hierarchy who are involved in the production, dissemination or delivery of the publication, service or material involved. This extensive review is ecclesiastically mandated to ensure each proposal meets the following three criteria.

First, the fixed donation amount must be affordable to a broad segment of the general public. Second, the amount must enable the Church to recover the costs of production or delivery of the materials. Third, the donation amount must be sufficient to enable the Church to remain operational so it can continue performing its religious functions, replenish stocks if necessary, and expand so it can provide for or minister to an ever growing congregation.

While CSI employed different methods to implement this policy over the years, the basic principles and review procedures have remained unchanged.

CSFSO **sets** rates for lodging and meals that are roughly commensurate **to** rates charged for comparable lodging and meals bylocal establishments.
