

TO THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION Communist Activities

Gentlemen:

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A series of sudden insanities and disturbances in Dianetic and Scientology groups reached seven last week on the West Coast.

In Atomic Energy's Richland, Washington a young boy who had never been treated with Dianetics or Scientology but whose father Verne McAdams is the local Scientology group leader in Richland suddenly and mysteriously became insane, so suddenly and so thoroughly that the head of the institution for insane in Richland, evidently of good security, suspects the use of LSD; the insanity producing drug so favored by the APA. Two of our ministers in that area at my request went further into the situation and by means we will not detail recovered from the boy information of which his family had been entirely ignorant. On instructions to find the "other psychiatrist" our ministers by this means located an unsuspected one in Atomic Energy's front yard, a man who had been the construction company doctor during the building of Richland and who had then turned psychiatrist and whose name strangely enough is Lenkowski (sp?). The boy had evidently had some association with this man before this sudden onset.

With this information not yet cool long distance from San Francisco Bay Area notified us of the sudden and inexplicable descent into insanity of one Wanda Collins. She is ravingly insane and yet was completely sane a day ago. Her people and our people cannot account for a missing nine hour period just before this onset. You should be intefested in this because Wanda Collins resigned from the Communist Party some time ago, foreswore it and tried to make amends with Scientology and would be a logical candidate for an LSD attack.

Concurrently with this in Phoenix Arizona

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our Mr. Edd Clark was suddenly arrested for practising medicine without a license, and this is very odd because he is the first Dianeticist or Scientologist in five years of world wide operation to be so accused. He could not have been practising medicine because Dianetics and Scientology seek only to assist able people to improve their talents and how no interest in sickness or insanity. He was arrested and without any search warrant all his papers and letters were seized even down to blank typewriter paper and were carried away, a fact which places this matter quite solidly in the field of the F.B.I. Ir. Clark is a half-blind deaf old man. He was once a chiropractor but has long since ceased to be one. He was told by the County Attorney that the County Attorney meant to "get to the bottom of this thing about Hubbard and Scientology."

The "bottom of the thing" can be found in "Who Knows and What" and "Who's Who in the East" in the local library or from bookstores which carry my books. My own life is about as hard to investigate as a white rock on a summer's day.

It is not uncommon in the past five years to have judges and attorneys mad-dogged at about what a terrible person I am and how foul is Scientology. Persons never named or available step in, spread violent tales and accusations and vanish. This mad-dogging has evidently been done at this County Attorney to prompt such a foolish action. This makes the third civil official in that area to go off half-cocked about Scientology. When it is all done and Scientology has been neatly ruined by the newspapers in the area and when all the charges have been quashed there is no one from whom any recompense can be drawn. "It was all a mistake"...

In 1950 the Dianetics Foundations were violently attacked and discredited. The 200 Foundation employees, when screened, yielded 35 Communist-connected persons. That done the corraction stopped. After three quiet years in the Phoenix area we forwarded to the Defense Department data on brain-washing. Instantly

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We became the subject of violence. Four people were seized by psychiatrists in that area to date and to this day to far at I know are still being held, their sanity shattered.

After we so informed the Defense Department about brain-washing technologies in our hands and offered them, we have been in a state of siege. Understand that we accuse the D.D. of nothing.

Psychiatrists as far north as Seattle have said they were "out to get every Scientologist." An Internal Revenue official has used those very words before witnesses and said he was going to get to the bottom of this thing in Fhoenix. People in suspicious condition were sent from one place in Southern California to be "treated by Scientology" for insanity and yet we have no interest in treating anyone, especially the inexplicably insane in widely different places both the dame way. All manner of defamatory runors have been scattered around about ne, questioning even my sanity which is fortunately a matter of good record with the Mavy as by statement "having no psychotic or neurotic symptoms whatsoever."

I have a wife and three little kids. I have be good many thousand people scattered around the world trying to help their fellow man and I am responsible for these people. I am trying to turn out some monographs on matters in my field of nuclear physics and psychology for submission to the government on the subject of alleviating some of the distress of radiation burns, a project I came east to complete. This lawless and brutal attack on Scientology now spreading evidently to three states will probably not end until a great deal of injustice and human suffering has occurred.

Would you please discover for me or for yourselves the exact names and where bouts of the persons whose statements inflamed the County Attorney in Phoenix in arresting a half-blind old man and seizing all his books and papers. If we have those names and if we trace then back we will have someplace to start on this madness

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which now reaches into three states. Can you do this for us?

I am getting additional copies of the material which was offered to the Defense Department since that agency has not admowledged or returned enything shipped to it about brain-washing and when I have these copies I will send one to you for this is the only starting place I know about for this outbreak and the matter, while far from conclusive at least tells me that something vent astray which was dangerous in the wrong hands.

Could you please have your Phoenix office obtain the names of the people who defamed us to the County Attorney? Your Bay Area and Richland offices have already been apprised of the incidents in those areas.

TO THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION Communist Activities Division Ref - my earlier correspondence.

Gentlemen:

Having gotten on a somewhat more even keel after the collapse of the organization in Phoenix, Afizona (the HASI) and having begun operation in the East ... with more public success and enthusiasm than I am used to, I have a better perspective on what occurred in Phoenix.

The attack on the HASI, like the attacks on the 1950 Hubbard Dianetic Research Foundation found psychiatry and Communist connected personnel very much in evidence and both active with defamation and very unreasonable — and unsuccessful — attack.

But something has now occurred which seems strange at this juncture and entirely too pat. I have received from an unimpeachable source an invitation to go to knussia. I have been told that this would be as easy as taking a taxi to the airport.

But the oddity of this invitation is that the person extending it, evidently on behalf of the Russian government, would not know anything about the trouble in Phoenix. He obviously has no connection with anything or anyone in Phoenix. Further, he knows little or nothing of Diznetics and Scientology and their organizational history and would not know, by any usual means, what occurred in Phoenix. Out of the blue, on an acquaintance with me from many, many years ago he locates me here, is very quiet and casual and then gradually works into the Russian situation and finally, with a burst of enthusiasm confides in me that in view of the state of my organizations in the United States (about which he would really know nothing in fact) and in view of the U.S. public attitude toward me (which is in actuality rather good considering) and in view of the fact that I am a cinch to be ruined by all the people who hate me in Internal Revenue" there is "really nothing left for it but to accept this Russian offer."

In the greatest spirit of friendship and comeraderie it seems that I can go to Russia as an advisor or a consultant and have my own laboratories and receive very high fees. And it is all so easy because it has already been ascertained that I could get my passport extended for Russia and all I had to do was go to Faris and there a Russian plane would pick me up and that would be that.

Indeed I suppose that that would be that.

This is my third invitation to go to Russia. The first was extended to me by a member of Amtorg in New York in 1938 who knew of my work in the field of the mind. The second occurred less directly in 1948 after some personal difficulty. This third has come when the Phoenix organization has been collapsed and it would not be known that it did not influence my own affairs as much as it might be thought.

With this some of the personnel connected with the recent Phoenix trouble has now drifted into Washington. Chukrie Marinus, the girl connected with Jackins in Seattle has arrived here. Wh. Burke Belknap, although an officer in Phoenix seems either the effect of that activity or assisted it and is here, busy on the phone eight hours a day with local calls in an area where he has never lived. Carol Hadley Bryans, also an officer in Phoenix, has likewise arrived and is likewise busy on the phone but neither of these last two seem prone to do any work but are very busy spreading discuiet amongst the personnel connected with me here. Two young men, also strangely connected arrived here and were sent home by me quickly - Bernard McKnown and Jim Henry both formerly of Hollywood - they arrived anxious to discredit the better people in the organization. One Jeck Horner has come here and has many rumors with which to upset Washington personnel - Horner will be recalled as the minister recently deported from England by the Home Secretary; I have just storped Horner from further defiance of English law on behalf of his "fiance" in London and further discrediting of Scientology in the English papers.

In short I have my hands a little full but unless such people actually can stir up great trouble we will survive easily and well. I am trying to disperse them from the area.

I suppose when the Russian-inclined "friend" finds that



my desires to travel in and work in Russia do not exist, I can expect more violent measures.

I have not given you the name of this contact because he is a little too highly placed on the Hill and because it may be that he is acting in an entirely friendly way and it may be, as I sometimes learn, that the fate of Scientology and its adventures has good word of mouth. I would not submit you an irresponsible report which then might find me under the TV cameras telling one of this man's committees why I reported him as a Communist because I do not know that he is - I only know that he and his influence has been quite liberal and in all the smoke of the Su mit he may be carried away with enthusiasm. But he did know, when no possible reasonable way existed for him to know too much about the activities of a subject about which he professes to know nothing and he has made several allusions to my possible fate in the United States, rather benign threats.

The U.S. Geological Survey library in Reston, Virginia has no publications by Lafayette Ronald Hubbard, nor is there reference to him in any other publication, in connection with Puerto Rico. I found publications by a Bela Hubbard with reference to a geological survey done in Puerto Rico in 1923.

In 1913 the New York Academy of Sciences started a scientific survey of Puerto Rico. Nineteen volumes that described these efforts were published between 1913 and 1942. Enclosed is a photocopied list of the volumes issued. Bela Hubbard's paper, "The geology of the Lares District, Porto Rico," can be found in vol. 2, part 1, of the New York Academy of Sciences—Scientific Survey of Porto Rico. The publications may possibly be available in Oregon Federal depository libraries shown on an enclosure. Your local library can borrow books for you from one of these libraries on interlibrary loan, or from the USGS library in Reston.

During 1898-1899 R. T. Hill and H. B. C. Nitze conducted mineral resource investigations in Puerto Rico. Enclosed are photocopies of the two reports from the U.S. Geological Survey Annual Reports for 1899.

I am not sure we are talking about the same man, for the scientist of which I have reference is Bela Hubbard who in 1923 prepared a geology survey of northwestern Puerto Rico, published by the New York Academy of Science as "Geology of the Lares District." Volume II. Scientific Survey of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. I have no other reference to Bela Hubbard.

In his work on the Lares District, Hubbard does have a short section on the minerals of the area that did not amount too much. If Dr. Howard Meyerhoff doesn't have any information about further minerals studies produced by Hubbard, I doubt that it ever occurred, as Meyerhoff is our outstanding expert on the geology and the minerals of Puerto Rico.

Agricultural Relief in Porto Rico

HEN the hurricane of Sept. 13, 1928, swept the island of Porto Rico it destroyed or damaged the coffee trees and shade trees in the coffee regions on approximately 200,000 acres, or 90 per cent of the total coffee acreage in the island, ruining a foremost income-producing industry.

One of the best coffee crops in the history of the island had been anticipated, and prospects were bright for the coffee farmers to make large reductions in outstanding loans against their farms. In many cases anticipated crops had been sold. () where also had received cash advances from their buyers on their crops to be harvested, in order that necessary repairs to buildings might be made before the harvesting actually commenced.

Following the disaster food, clothing, building materials and medical aid were supplied to these unfortunate people. In extending relief of a more permanent nature to the coffee immers the American Red Cross had four plans. First, the planting of the coffee seed beds in order that coffee seedlings might be furnished to the farmers to replace coffee trees lost in the storm. Second, the furnishing of 2,000 sets of pruning tools in order that the trees salvaged might be made to produce a maximum crop in a near future. Third, the distribution of garden seed in order that a quick food supply might

be made available. Fourth, the clearing away of the debris in order that the few coffee and shade trees remaining might be given every chance to recover.

The results of the third plan—that of furnishing garden seed—were in evidence practically two months after the first seeds were issued in the abundant supplies of fresh vegetables available over the entire island. The results were so far reaching that it was decided to place a proviso in the fourth plan—that of clearing away the debris in the farms—so that every farmer who received assistance in the clearing of his farm agreed to plant half an acre in garden seed, the crop to be divided equally between the owner and the laborers.

Considerable opposition was met in placing the second plan in operation—that of pruning the coffee trees and shade trees—for to the coffee farmers, who in very few instances had practiced pruning, it appeared that what remaining bush was left was going to be destroyed. The Insular Department of Agriculture was of great assistance in overcoming this opposition as the Commissioner of Agriculture had just returned from Colombia, where he had made an extensive study of the methods employed on the coffee farms in that country and he was able to bring back concrete facts of the results from scientific pruning. Today there is no opposition to pruning, for in Porto Rico trees that were pruned in September, 1929,

having been cut back to within four inches from the ground, in six months had strong, healthy shoots approximately four and one-half feet high with a great many new shoots blooming. This is regarded as assuring that a small crop will be harvested from these new trees this year. Not only were coffee and shade trees pruned, but the wild orange and grapefruit trees showed marked improvement from pruning.

In carrying out the plan of furnishing coffee seedlings to replace trees totally destroyed by the storm, 165 seed beds were planted and 10,000,000 coffee seedlings raised for free distribution by August, 1930. It is estimated that these seedlings will replant approximately 15,000 acres. These seed beds have been under the direct supervision of the Insular, Department of Agriculture and the seedlings were raised from selected seeds.

Seeds planted in 1929 which are now one year old average approximately 15 inches in height. In some of the seed beds where there was a larger amount of rainfall the seedlings are higher and some were in bloom late in March.

In carrying out the plan of clearing away the debris, a total of about 119,700 acres

In summing up the results of the Red Cross agricultural relief program in Porto Rico there are three outstanding facts which, it is confidently believed. will aid in correcting the economic condition of the island. First, the farmers have been shown, through the distribution of garden seed, that a quick crop may be raised which provides food of a highly nutritive value, and which will be, in the opinion of the medical authorities, of great assistance in the fight against malnutrition and tuberculosis. Second, the farmers have been shown that it is practical to prune their coffee, shade and other trees which produce income and that by this

pruning the stock on those plants may practically be renewed in two years' time without replanting. Third, through the distribution of coffee seedlings from selected seed, which produce stronger and healthier coffee trees, the old practice of picking up seedlings which originated from coffee beans that dropped off the trees and germinated, and which in a great many instances were not strong and healthy plants, has been abandoned to a large extent.

Not only has the American Red Cross assisted the farmers of Porto Rico, but its relief program assisted the Insular Department of Agriculture in developing the agricultural industry of the island on a scientific basis. This Department has been most cooperative in carrying out the agricultural relief program and it is planning to establish demonstration plots in each district with a total area of about 2,000 acres as a permanent memorial to the Red Cross work in the



island in order that the farmers may always envisage the results of scientific farming.

The Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner of the Insular Department of Agriculture have expressed themselves as being very grateful to the American Red Cross for the part it has played in assisting the coffee farmers to rehabilitate themselves. In his annual report to the Governor for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1929, the Commissioner states, in referring to the work of the Bureau of Agricultural Extension: "The most important work carried out by this bureau during the year has been the project on coffee-seed beds for which the American Red Cross appropriated the sum of \$30,000."

"Throughout the island the rehabilitation program has met with perfect cooperation and everywhere there is confidence in a complete restoration of the important coffee industry.

1. In 1932-33, conducted first mineralogical survey of Puerto Rico.

Clifford Kaye, U.S. Geological Survey, Interior Dept., Boston, Mass., 1-617/223-7200, who has done geological work in Puerto Rico, reported on June 22, 1970, that Hubbard's name was not mentioned or listed as staff in the Mineral Resources Study of 1932-34. Also, Kaye said neither the U.S. Bureau of Mines nor the Puerto Rican government mentioned Hubbard. Kaye said a man named Bela Hubbard published materials on geological surveys of Puerto Rico, but that was in the early 1920s. Kaye said Dr. Howard A. Meyerhoff, who was chairman of the Mineral Resources Committee, could definitely wax state whether Hubbard was ever involved. Meyerhoff is retired; lives at 3625 S. Florence Place, Tulsa, Oklahoma, 1-918/743-2113.

2. Undated. Survey flights in U.S. to aid adjustment of field and facility data.

Unable to check.

3. Sometime between 1933 and 1939, obtained valuable data during Carribbean expedition for U.S. Hydrographic Office in Washington, D.C., and for the University of Michigan.

Mrs. Carolyn Anderson, National Gengrek Geographic Society, Washington, D.C., 1-202/296-7500, on June 22, 1970, reported she contacted Miss Clare Thomas, public information office of the Oceanographic Office of the Department of the Navy in Suitland, Md., 1-763/301-1370 (Oceanographic Cffice replaced Hydrographic Office). Miss Thomas, in turn, contacted William G. Watt, Arlington, Va., 1-703/522-7032, who is retired from old Hydrographic Cffice and who was involved in Carribbean expedition. Watt can recall no one named Hubbard on the expeditions, and can't recall any University of Michigan involvement. Watt said only nonmilitary people on expeditions were hydrographers, a skill Hubbard has never claimed. (It should be noted the expeditions took place while Hubbard was not in the military. Hubbard in Marines from Oct. 1927, to Cct., 1928, and in Mavy from June 25, 1941, to about May 27, 1950.)

3. 1939-40. Spent 13 months on Alaska Experimental Radio Expedition to investigate a new method of radio position finding entailing a new aerial and a new mathematical computation and instruments.

Mrs. Anderson of the National Geographic Society reported she checked the authorative, multi-volume Artic Biblography and could find nothing commercial 1939-40 Alaska Experimental Radio Expedition.

4. In 1940, to Alaska to rewrite the U.S. Coast Pilot, Alaska, Part I. (The Coast Pilot is a navigational guide.)

Contacted Lloyd L. Clay, chief, Coast Pilots Branch, U.S. Coast and Geodesic Survey, Rockville, Md., 1-301/496-8214. Clay checked the 1940 roster of Coast and Geodesic officers, as well as annual reports and bulletins, but could find no mention of L. Ron Hubbard: He did locate an officer in 1940 named Leonard S. Hubbard, but he retired in 1956 and is now age 74. Checking further, Clay contacted retired civilian Coast Pilot employe Frank S. Farquhar, who was in Washington, D.C., office in 1940. Farcuhar reported no civilians were at that time sent to do field xxxi work. L. Ron Hubbard still would have been in mufti. Clay said the U.S. Coast Pilot, Alaska, was revised and rewritten in 1932. Annual supplements followed until the next complete revision in 1943. The revision was substantially based on the field work of Lt. Earl A. Daley, who was sent to Alaska for that purpose in 1942.

This is in response to your letter of January 15 which requested information concerning Mr. Hubbard under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), Title 5 U.S.C. 552. As I will explain below, we cannot provide most of the information you want unless Mr. Hubbard authorizes us in writing to do so.

We can respond to your request for information about the amount of benefits presently being paid to him. Title 38 U.S.C. 3301(c) states that "the amount of pension, compensation or dependency and indemnity compensation of any beneficiary shall be made known to any person who applies for such information..." Accordingly, you are advised that Mr. Hubbard is presently receiving veterans benefits in the amount of \$182.00 per month.

Title 5 U.S.C. 552(b)(6), which you have referred to as exemption 6, exempts some information from disclosure without the consent of the person to whom the information pertains. The diagnosis of medical disorders and the degree to which each disorder is disabling; the total percent of disablement; a veteran's address; the address to which benefit checks are being sent; dates of hospitalization by a military service or the Veterans Administration; and conditions for which a veteran has been hospitalized are facts coming within this exemption. Disclosure of this information without Mr. Hubbard's consent would be a clearly unwarranted invasion of his personal privacy, in my judgment.

Congress clearly intended this information to be treated as personal and confidential. This is shown by Title 38 U.S.C. 3301(a) which provides that all records pertaining to any claim under any law administered by the VA shall be confidential and privileged. Regulations implementing this law, Title 38 Code of Federal Regulations 1.500 through 1.527, preclude disclosure of such information in circumstances presented by your request unless the veteran consents to the disclosure. Additionally, Title 5 U.S.C. 552a, commonly called the Privacy Act of 1974, with some exceptions not pertinent here, prohibits disclosure of personal records in the possession of a Federal agency without the prior written consent of the individual to whom the records pertains.

Pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 552(a)(b)(A)(i) and VA Regulations 553.1(B) and 557(A), you are hereby notified that you have a right to appeal this decision to the Administrator of Veterans Affairs. Any appeal must be in writing, should
